Health Care Services Available

WinMed Health Services are available at each of the buildings in the district for students enrolled in St. Bernard-Elmwood Place Schools. Anyone interested should contact one of the building secretaries to receive additional information or enrollment and consent forms. Once the forms are completed and returned, a Winton Hills Medical Care provider will contact the parent or guardian.

Weather Alert Information

In the event of inclement weather, St. Bernard-Elmwood Place Schools may be either canceled or placed on a two-hour delay. Normally, that determination will be made by 6:00 a.m., with notification provided in the following manner:

- Radio and television stations will be notified.
- An email will be sent to all addresses subscribing to School News listserve. To subscribe to this listserve, please see "School News Listserve Instructions" on our district website at www.sbepschools.org.
- A message will be posted on the district website.

If a two-hour delay is in effect, buses will pick up students at their regularly-scheduled stops two hours later than the usual time. All parochial and Scarlet Oaks transportation also will be delayed by two hours.

School two-hour delayed start times will be as follows:

St. Bernard-Elmwood Place Jr./Sr. High School (Grades 7-12).....	10:00 a.m.
Breakfast for grades 7-12.....	9:30 a.m.
Elmwood Place Elementary School (Grades K-6).....	10:20 a.m. (with no morning pre-k)
St. Bernard Elementary School (Grades K-6).....	10:20 a.m.
Breakfast for grades K-6	9:50 a.m.

These procedures are in place every school year to help keep students and staff safe, whether they walk or ride.

An unexpected early dismissal from school will be a last resort; however, procedures are in place in case of an emergency. While most delays, cancellations, or early dismissals are due to inclement or deteriorating weather conditions, loss of electrical power, water damage, or other emergency circumstances could also require adjustments to normal school hours.

In the event of inclement weather or other emergencies after the start of the school day, students in elementary schools (grades pre-K-6) will not be released without direct contact with a parent or person listed on the student's emergency form. If possible, bus transportation will be provided for students who ride buses.

Paired reading is a MAX Teaching strategy that is used consistently in EPE classrooms from first through sixth grades.



Candlelight Concert

The combined elementary choirs from SBE and EPE performed at this year's Candlelight Concert on Wednesday, December 12th, in the high school auditorium. Their singing was outstanding and was a great addition to the concert.



November Student-of-the-Month Ceremony

Each month, a student is picked from each grade level to be student-of-the-month. Students are selected based on good character, behavior, and citizenship. All students gather in the gym for a special assembly. Students-of-the-month receive special magnets for their parents to display on their vehicles.



Real-World Math Experience for Kindergartners

Math classrooms throughout grades K-6 frequently use hands-on activities and manipulatives to experience math concepts in a concrete way. Math in Focus, a board-adopted program, features a concrete-pictorial-abstract learning progression. These Kindergartners are arranging two-dimensional shapes together to create a "real-life" object to demonstrate their understanding that shapes can be found in many things throughout the world.



Collaboration Time for EPE Teachers

Elmwood Place Elementary teachers in grades K-3 often use teacher in-service days and regular meeting times to work together and collaborate. One focus this year is to use the reports and tools available as part of the MAPS Assessment (which all K-3 students take three times a year) to analyze data, inform instruction, and promote individual student growth in math and reading.



Perennial Math Tournament

Titan mathematicians showed outstanding leadership skills and represented the gifted program in an outstanding way when St. Bernard-Elmwood Place Schools proudly hosted the annual Perennial Math Tournament this year. Two hundred students from twenty schools participated in this competition, and fourteen SBEP students received certificates of achievement.

Schools searching for children with disabilities:

The St. Bernard-Elmwood Place City School District seeks to identify, locate, and evaluate all children with handicaps, birth through age 21, based upon I.D.E.A. (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act) eligibility. This includes children attending private or parochial schools whose parents reside within our district.

Conditions such as multi-handicapped, hearing handicapped, visually handicapped, orthopedically and/or health handicapped, severe behavior handicapped, developmentally handicapped, specific learning disabled, autistic and speech and language handicapped would be included.

Additionally, it is the intent of the district to ensure that students who are handicapped within the definition of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 are evaluated, identified and served. Section 504 disabilities are mental or physical impairments or a history of such impairments that "substantially limit one or more major life activities."

In accordance with the Ohio State Plan for the Education of Ohio's Homeless Children and Youth and the Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act (P.L. 100-77), as amended in 1990, homeless school-age children shall have access to a free, appropriate public education which would be provided to the children of a resident of Ohio, consistent with Ohio's school attendance laws. If you are aware of or suspect that a homeless child is eligible for placement under this policy, please contact Mr. Carter Cordes at 513-482-7115.
